

DIRECTOR'S REFLECTIONS

As I was preparing the play I felt that the Cold War was well in the past, and issues of spying were no longer relevant. However, events have proved me wrong; a few months ago the deportation of a suspected Russian spy was headline news. It seems that there are just as many spies in Britain now as there were at the height of the Cold War. Although we are no longer a major military power we still have information that other countries want badly enough to resort to deceit. The spies in this play were stealing secret information about the guidance and defence systems on our submarines; that is still the case today!

However, I have always felt that the play was relevant today. Russian spies are not frequently in the news, but terrorists certainly are. And they live in ordinary neighbourhoods just as the Cold War spies did.

And so the same questions remain. Is everyone as ordinary as they look? Could your neighbours be deceiving you? How would you feel if it was suggested that your friends were not what they seemed ? Clearly they have deceived you. But if you knew that MI5 was close to arresting them and you did not warn them, would you be guilty of betraying them? There are two sides to every coin, and clearly they have not been telling you the whole truth. But does that make it acceptable for you to help MI5 collect evidence against them and arrest them? What effect would such a dilemma have on your familv ?

Pack of Lies tells the story of what happened to one family in such a situation.

The Upper Crust

In our next play, Oscar Wilde's trivial comedy for serious people *The Importance of Being Earnest*, careful appreciation is given to the provision and consumption of a simple delicacy indispensible to the satisfactory pursuit of graceful living, the perfect cucumber sandwich. At the capable hands of Lane the butler, the restorative and restful qualities of this deceptively uncomplicated comestible are dependably dispensed at that most civilised of gatherings, teatine.

Sadly Oscar Wilde has left no detailed guidelines as to the actual preparation of the desirable delicacy itself, but here Wimborne Drama, ever solicitous of its loyal audience, humbly offers the fruits of its own researches into the subject.

Lane's recipe for the cucumber sandwich

Ingredients

- * 1 long, firm, young English cucumber (if necessary, purchase for ready money)
- * salt
- fine ground white pepper
- 1 loaf white or brown bread.
- softened butter

Method

- Slice the cucumber very thinly. Salt the slices lightly and place in colander for at
- least 15 minutes to drain. Press to release water, pat dry with fine linen towels.

 * Spread one side of each slice of bread with the creamed butter. Avoid getting butter on your cuffs.
- Lav a double layer of cucumber slices onto half the bread slices.
- Season the cucumber with pepper.
- Place a slice of bread over the top of the cucumber and press down lightly.

Repeat for each sandwich.

- Trim the crusts off each sandwich, and cut them into either 3 rectangles, 4 triangles, 4 squares or 4 octagonals (squares with the corners trimmed off).
- Arrange neatly on a serving plate. Decorate discretely with some sprigs of mint and thinly sliced cucumber.
- Serve immediately and impeccably.
