THE CAST

DAVID GREEN joined the club in 1975 and his first role was that of Robert Danvere, the male lead, in the 1976 Spring production, "There's a Girl in my Soup". David moved to Wimborne in 1975 from Norwich where he was a member of the Maddermarket Theatre which presents 10 plays a year, ranging from Music Hall, Pantomime and Farce to the classics of Shakespeare, Shaw and Ibsen. In Norwich he helped a friend of his to stage an adaptation of H.H. Murnoe's "The World of Saki", and has also co-produced in Wimborne. His role of Terry Dexter is his seventh with the Company.

SYENCER HARE joined the club in 1975 and first appeared as Jimmy the cockney drummer in the 1976 Spring production of "There's a Girl in my Soup". Other appearances have been in the Ustinov comedy "Halfway up the Tree" and as Corporal Green in "The Amorous Frawm", a role he enjoyed very much. His appearance as Guthrie in"Dr. Forelle" was his first in a serious play, but he admits to haveng a preference for comedy, as demonstrated by his role as Edward Hawkins in "Darling Mr. London". Spencer enjoys playing the guitar and singing, and is a member of the recently formed Folk Group.

SIPCN JACKSON acted with several drama clubs in Yorkshire before coming to Dorset where he has also been a member of Blandford Dramatic Society. His appearances at Wimborne have included the detective in "The Gentle Hook" by Francis Durbridge, the chef in "The Amorous Prawn" and the curate in "Darling Mr. London".

SPENCER MADAN-MAYERS was born in Corfe Mullen and went to Queen Elizabeth School, where he was in meny school plays. He joined Wimborne Drama Club in August of this year, and this is his first part with them.

JAME SHERWILL made her first appearance with the club as Sorel Bliss in "Hay Fever" and followed this with the part of Helen Winter in "The Other Fellow's Osts". She took part in several school plays under the guidance of Duggie Trehearne, and trained for ballet reaching Sadlers Wells Scholarship in 1959. Jane appeared as June Lister in "Dr. Forelle" last Autumn, and as Monique in our Spring production, "Derling Kr. London".

SUSAN SULLY studied Modern Dance at the Art of Movement Studio after leaving school and, later, Drama at Training College where she took part in various productions, including "The Frime of Miss Jean Brodie" and "Trelawny of the Wells". This is her first part for Wimborne Drame Club since Joining in April.

CARCLYN WCCDWARD made her debut with Wimborne Drama Club at the age of 10 in a walk-on part as a choirboy in "pools Paradise". She has a longstanding interest in drama and music (also being a member of the Drama Club Folk Group) and after appearing in various musicals throughout her school life, she joined the club to take the part of Frivate Susie Tidmarsh in "The Amorous Frawn". Since then she has taken part in the club's one act play entry for Canford Festival and the 1979 production of "The Cher Fellow's Oats".

THE PRODUCER

THELMA DRYDEN is one of the longest serving members of the club, and has always played an active part in it's running. Thelms performed in many of the plays which were staged at Church House and Famphill School before the club moved to the Allendale Centre and, with one exception, says she has always been cast as the villain of the piece: Thelms enjoys producing thrillers, though her favourite plays are fantasies and these include"Dinner with the Family", "Dear Brutus", and "Ming Round the Moon".

COVER MOTIF

The motif on the cover of this Programme was designed by Thelma Dryden, who was inspired by the tree which is in the grounds outside the main entrance to the Allendale Centre, and which has been a familiar sight to Thelma since her schooldays at the building which is now owned by Antiquatat.

The design incorporates the masks of comedy and tragedy, with the mast of comedy on the side of the tree in leaf representing Spring (when we normally produce comedies) and the mask of tragedy on the barren side of the tree for Autumn (when we present a thriller).

WIMBORNE DRAMA CLUB

This Club is probably one of the longest established in the area and has been going, although not always thriving, for more than fifty years.

Soon after the opening of the Allendale Centre we were able to move here, and presented the first play of the "Allendale" series, which was "Doctor in Love". Most of the plays have been either modern titles or older plays like "Hay Fever", which have become 'standards'.

We still have a regrettably small active membership and there may be many people who do not realise that a three-act play with a cast of say, nine people, keeps about 20 people busy for many weeks before it is staged. Although it has always been our policy to give new members some involvement in a production, this is not always possible if they have joined after the production has been cast and rehearsals are under way; feeling themselves unecessary they then tend to lose interest and drift away. The answer to this is to have more enterprises in hand such as 'At Homes', revues, etc. which starts a vicious circle, as to do this we need more members.

Ideally, we should like to have twenty more active members

and do at least three plays a year.

We also have another scheme under way to try and promote interest in the club, and this is our Patron's Night. We invite anyone interested in Drama to become a Patron of the club, and for the small yearly subscription of £3.00 this entitles them to one free ticket for each production, and an invitation to join the cast on stage at the end of First Night for a glass of wine, to look around backstage, and air their opinions (good or badt) about the production. 
