Welcome to this performance of Spiders Web by Agatha Christie. The play, written in 1954, is somewhat unusual in that it was written for the stage at the request of its star Margaret Lockwood, who mainly appeared in films, had never appeared in a West End production apart from Peter Pan and wanted a role in a comedy thriller. Christie also wrote a role for Lockwood's 14 year old daughter although she did not appear in the finished production.



I suppose the main attraction for me in Christie's work is the old fashioned setting, which perhaps to those of us of a certain age brings back memories of a probably imagined childhood, plus the many red herrings with which she seeks to baffle us. Hopefully you will find occasion to smile or even laugh at what is intended to be more light hearted than some of Christie's plays.

As usual I have a very dedicated cast with one or two new faces all of whom have worked incredibly hard to bring their characters to life. The set for this play is more complex than usual and has taken my set designer and main builder Colin Pile many days of work in his spare time to bring it to fruition, although, as always, other members of the company have given much assistance, to all of them many thanks.

I would like to mention a couple of minor points about the script which you may find curious. I have been hassled several times by members of the cast and backstage crew about the appearance of what appears to be a cauliflower when it is supposed to be a broccoli. In the 1950s and 60s, broccoli were generally very similar to cauliflower but were a winter and spring variety, although hardier. The variety we now know as broccoli was grown occasionally but was known as green or purple sprouting broccoli and was not so widely available. I have therefore assumed that the winter broccoli is what is mentioned in the script.

The term Habeas Corpus is also used to denote the impossibility of having a trial without a body, which is not a strictly true interpretation as it usually meant the body of evidence, but which in any case is not nowadays used.

Once again thank you to all who have assisted especially the back stage crew and Tivoli staff.

Settle back and enjoy the show.

MEET THE CAST

ALAN DESTER Henry Hailsham -Brown

Rhodesia (now Harare, Zimbabwe) and as a child wanted to be a marine biologist or a professional jockey, the latter of which he achieved after moving to England in 1989. He now works in software sales. Recent actina credits include And Then There Were None for Wimborne Drama Nightmare - The Fright Of Your Life for KCA Players and Habeas Corpus for BLTC. "I enjoyed working with KCA because the size of the part made it challenging. But And Then There Were None was also a favourite because this is the nicest, most fun group I have ever worked with but still manage to maintain an exceptional standard". Alan has also fallen in love with the Tivoli.

PAUL DODMAN Inspector Lord Paul was born in Chipping Norton.



Oxon and moved to Dorset in 1974 He always wanted to be a farmer when he was very young, although now he teaches. Paul played Orsino in last summer's open air show Twelfth Night and will be directing this summer's production Lord Arthur Savile's Crime.
